2nd June 2021, marked an important event for Jones Adventist College (JAC) in Vella La Vella, Solomon Islands, after 25 years of moving from classroom to classroom and from one building to another to use as a worship centre. Sasa Rore Memorial Church was dedicated to the Glory of God and can cater for a capacity of 525 students and staff of the college.

The Church is named after one of the Pioneer Missionary of Vella La Vella, Pastor Sasa Rore, who did his service around Solomon Islands and the PNG Mission.

The church was constructed in 2012 by the Former Member of Parliament to North Vella La Vella who was the founder of JAC as well, Late Allan Paul Jama. The task of completing the church grew strong in 2014 and organized fundraising was done both in and around JAC throughout the years. Every money collected was directed for the building of the church.



JAC was blessed to have support from family members around Solomon and abroad, students and staff of 2012 – 2021 and the surrounding communities of Dovele Region who worked together to complete the church by the 2nd of June.

The General Secretary (Pr David Filo) and the Chief Financial Officer (Mr Bradon Vavozo) of Solomon Island Mission, with other Government officials, along with the family members of Late Allan Paul and the surrounding communities came for the dedication program.

The Principal, Mr. Bevan Tutuo said that without the commitment and hard work from the staff and students and other supporting communities, this project would not have pulled through. All praise and glory goes back to God for this big achievement.
