# A CHEERFUL GIVER


On the 30th of April, the Parents and Teachers Association (PTA) for Beulah College, Tonga, organised a fundraising night as part of their allocated support (of \$10,0000 towards the school. The program for the night was called 'FOAKI FIEFIA' in English 'CHEERFUL GIVING'. According to the head tutor of the school Siaosi Masila, "this is the first time ever the school has organised such fundraising with free willing offering and songs of praise." Normally, PTA fundraising was done through parents 'bring n buy' of food items or some sort of concert such as the involvement of the school brass band in order to try and raise the annually \$10,000 PTA contribution to the school budget.

The PTA committee with much fasting and prayers decided this year to do what the Bible counsels in 2 Corinthians 9:6-8, the tenet of cheerful giving. To God be the glory within less than an hour after the school chaplain Pr Akuila shared a powerful message and a special music from the school choir. The school collected through giving of offering a total of \$95,167.45TOP. The program was broadcasted live on Hope Channel Tonga and a few handful of Alumni in overseas donated online also an offering of \$30,000TOP. The chairperson for PTA Mrs Ilaise Taumoua presented \$82628.35 to the school principal Mr Lemani Matui and \$12,539.10 remained with the PTA hence other projects for the school.



The Éducation Director Mr Fatongia Hopoate states, "the success of the program indicates how much the church members, parents and Alumni value and support Adventist Education."

# SPELLING BEE COMPETITION



It is totally new for our participants from the Solomon Island but we have to accept that this is the way forward during this pandemic. We had our remote schools connected from their various schools and it was just amazing how technology could reach far and near. " One of the participants states "it was a great day out for us chaplains and we were inspired by the presenters." The TPUM education department is planning on another chaplains day out in September.

In 2015 a new Adventist Primary School in Temotu Province in the Easten Solomon Island was established, with only 6 teachers and 81 students. In 2017 the school held a Book Week and from the 24th-28th May 2020 the school held its second book week. According to the principal Mrs Nester Rex "We planned to hold such event annually, having seen its impact on our children." Activities involve speeches from the school principal, chairman of the school board and the Provincial government ( Education Rep). Students activities for the day involved: children read on stage, children display the story books they have created, children display their writing through stories , poems and rhymes, Children put on special items and visiting of students stall.


# **GOD IN LITERACY**

At the end of the Trans-Pacific Union Mission Quinquennial Session November 18th to 20th, 2020, Pastor Kenneth Fuliese was called to serve as the new Mission President for the American Samoa Mission. COVID-19 restrictions made it impossible for the new appointee to travel to the eastern Samoan island, but immediately began lending his help through zoom meetings, video conferences and so much more. However, in the Lord's favor, President Pastor Fuliese and family were allowed to travel to American Samoa on April 27th, 2021.







Port restrictions due to the pandemic made it impossible for church members of the AS Mission to welcome the President at the airport as customary. Therefore, the ministerial staff of pastors under the leadership of District Director Pastor Uili Solofa, the American Samoa Adventist Media staff, along with a few teachers and 25 students of lakina Adventist Academy lined up the driveway from the airport to the main road with posters and banners to welcome our new president. After 5 months following the appointment, American Samoa at last prepared to welcome its first President under the new mission. Students cheerfully waved with posters that stated, "Welcome Pastor Fuliese and Family", and "Finally, we meet!" Pastor Fuliese and family waved from the shuttles as they were transported to their quarantine site for three days. On May 9th, 2021, Pastor Fuliese along with first lady Linda and children officially met with the American Samoa Mission, and today, we all work together for the glory of the Lord. The faculty, staff, and administration of lakina Adventist Academy looks forward to what God has in store for us as we have transitioned from a district to a mission, under the leadership of Pastor Fuliese and family. Despite of COVID restrictions, limitations and cutbacks, Pastor Fuliese has reiterated to all that God has called us to GO, and it is now our turn to pick up ourselves, prepare for the work, and GO for the Lord! 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# A TRIP TO THE NORTHERN ISLANDS OF VANUATU

I Jeffesen Trief the mission education director was fortunate to be part of a team of four traveling to Banks on the 30th of April, for a week, to run the first district meeting at Motor-lava Island. A hidden paradise with friendly and kind people. The island located among the group of islands called Banks and Torres group.

The community still kept the respect that was lost in most of the Vanuatu communities. The whole village community, Anglican, Assembly of God and Adventist, all continue to contribute in cleaning the compound twice each week. That includes male and female, young and old. Secondly stealing is not common in this community. I had a pleasant surprise to leave the four supported windows open 24 hours at the Bungalow where I stayed and nothing went missing. Thirdly, we came to realise that all loud noises subsided at 9pm to respect the privacy of everyone who wishes to have a quiet evening. I wish it could happen in other communities in our Seventh Day Adventist communities.



I had the privilege to fly on the wings of hope on Tuesday to Gaua with Dr Mark who has contributed enormously to the medical needs in the province. I visited Matafunga Adventist junior Secondary school supported by Dr Mark, Mrs Naumi and their friends. The community at Motorlava are looking forward to register a French primary school and junior secondary school under the Seventh Day Adventist Education Authority.
