My last editorial. Sitting at the airport in Port Moresby as I start this editorial. My last trip to Papua New Guinea. Last time coming back to Australia from a work trip. Last time to catch up with some folk. So many lasts in these last few weeks.

Jesus believed in the power of influence. He sent his disciples out two by two. Why? Because He saw the power of influence. We don't know which disciples were paired up together. Sometimes it would be really nice to know that.

If I had been Judas' parents, I think I would want to have known and then asked that disciple some questions.

- Why was your influence not strong enough to help change our son's priorities?
- · What did you talk about as you walked and shared?
- Was our son able to heal and do miracles too? If so why did it not change his attitude?
- · Did you spend any time together in prayer?
- Did you really take the time to talk heart to heart?

As I come to the close of my teaching career, I am forced to evaluate what I could have done better. But now all I can do is ask God to take my meagre efforts and bring the best good possible out of them. Ultimately - it is what gets our attention most that indicates who or what we become.

So my challenge for all of us – is to look to Jesus, the Author and Finisher of our faith. To focus on Him and His goodness and grace. To Reveal a Jesus of love and grace. To influence our students by our own vibrant, thriving relationship with Him so that they too, want to have that same relationship with Jesus. I pray that your influence will be a godly influence.

KAUMA ADVENTIST ON FIRE

On the 2nd of November, at about 12:45am, the principal was disturbed by a loud intermittent crackling noise of a tree on fire, so he thought, coupled with loud and heavy pounding of something strange for which he could not figure out. He shook himself out of bed and went down from his little "bwia" a local hut similar to a small bungalow. As he looked toward the direction of the commotion, he saw balls of fire steaming out from the classrooms. As soon as he was sure that the administration offices and classrooms were actually on fire, he offered a sincere prayer asking God for His protection. After his short prayer, the principal went down to see the burning building but already on the site a large crowd of people, students and teachers frantically attempting to quench that wildfire.

In the absence of fire trucks, dozens of buckets with well water were hurled at the uncontrollable flames. The boys could only throw water at the fire from a distance where they could not be caught by the cruel fangs of a monster in a peaceful night of Kauma Adventist High School.



The powerful fire continued its journey to the school library in one direction and to the science laboratory in the other. On its way to the library it destroyed one classroom and jumped to the second one. However, the boys on the roof with buckets of precious well water were successful in retaining the advancing enemy to a halt before completely destroying the second classroom. The library was fortunate to be left intact and that raging fire finally became manageable and eventually kept quiet for the rest of that eventful night.



The Principal's office was destroyed soon after the Registrar's office was exhumed, and was further believed to be the starting point of fire. Speculations had it that the fire started from the curtains that were hanging outside the windows in the principal's and registrar's office. Both offices kept school records in filing cabinets, textbooks, printers, data projectors, and other office equipment.

The Deputy Principal's office and the Accountant's office were the next target of the invading enemy. Everything was attacked on its way, the safe for the school money, tables, chairs, chainsaw, cartons of A4 paper etc were all annihilated. The Deputy Principal's office became the grave of less than a hundred students' mobiles, including their computers and i-pads, etc.

Fortunately, God did not allow the fire to continue its path of destruction to the next classroom, the school canteen, the commerce teachers' office, the next big classroom and the science laboratory with various chemicals and apparatus and scores of science textbooks. With the help of the boys and the constant supply of water to smother the burning timber and roofing iron, it finally gave up hope. The hustle and bustle of the inexperienced but brave "firemen" reduced their momentum. They had successfully cooled the dragon's fierce anger before it could obliterate the very existence of Kauma's pride as an Adventist High School. Then the Kauma warriors were seen yarning for a while after winning the battle. We sincerely praise God for His intervention! - Tekemau Ribabaiti
